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BIO

Christine Ristaino teaches Italian and is the faculty advisor for a number of programs related to social justice at Emory University. Her most recent book is a memoir, *All the Silent Spaces*, which details her experiences with violence. She has also coauthored an academic publication titled *Lucrezia Marinella and the "Querelle des Femmes" in Seventeenth-Century Italy* and the first edition of a book series *The Italian Virtual Class*.

- Ristaino writes about surviving molestation, rape, and being attacked in front of her 3- and 5-year old children.
- Her memoir, *All the Silent Spaces*, talks about the aftereffects of violence, from the perspective of somebody who has experienced it firsthand.
- Ristaino writes and publishes op-eds on overcoming violence, having difficult conversations, and equity, in publications such as the *Guardian*, the *Washington Post*, the *Huffington Post*, *Pacific Standard*, and the *Atlanta Journal Constitution*.
- Ristaino's book is timely, written before and during the rise of the #MeToo movement, which has trended in at least 85 countries and is creating historic cultural transformation.
- Ristaino utilizes storytelling to challenge and change the paradigm around sexual assault.
- Ristaino has spoken at important events in order to foster culture change, such as the Women's March on Roanoke, the Thinkposium on Equity, and RespectCon.
- Ristaino has given interviews on NPR and has also been featured on a number of podcasts..


